Second Collection – Diocese of Mandeville - Jamaica

Next week, there will be a Second Collection with our sister parishes in the Diocese of Mandeville Jamaica. Funds donated will help provide the most basic of needs such as food and clothing, educating their young, house orphans and the destitute elderly in a dignified way and also provide medical care and help put a roof over their heads of some without a home. Your generosity in this collection will help with this ongoing need to help others.

About the Cover – Pictured on the bulletin cover is the stained glass window in St. Patrick's Church depicting the parable of the Good Samaritan. The window shows the story as found in Luke's gospel (10: 25-37) where a Jew was robbed and left for dead along a busy road. A temple priest and a Levite saw and should have helped him but chose to ignore him and passed by. However, a Samaritan (a people generally at odds with the Jews) took pity on him and saw to his immediate and long term care. The Samaritan is imaged as the Lord Jesus – his robes and the style of halo are strong hints that this is Christ.

But look carefully at the faces of the two. Aren't they the same face? There's a whole sermon going on here in stained glass! There's Jesus who brings healing to those in need and there's also Jesus who is in need of healing. Read the gospel from Matthew (25: 31-46) to help understand what is meant.

Former pastor, Fr. William P. Clark wrote a book, "Brief History of St. Patrick's Parish" in 1937. He wrote that the window, a gift of Mr. and Mrs. Michael McNamara costing \$180, was added at the time of the addition to the church in 1910-11.

Do you receive the word of God with joy as the Thessalonians did? Their faith showed in their actions. They became models for other believers.
