About the Cover - Pictured is the icon "written" in 2006 of the Baptism of the Lord and found in the baptistery area of St. Patrick Church. Icons, originating in Eastern Christianity, depict not so much a historical event as they enable the viewer by means of contemplation to enter into the mystery that they depict. Matthew, Mark, and Luke record the baptism of the Lord and it is alluded to in the Gospel of John. In this icon, John the Baptist is depicted in camel's hair clothing baptizing Jesus. Near John is the ax and tree -Luke 3:9. Jesus is stripped of clothing but also of his divinity in coming as a man. The servant angels are holding Jesus' clothing. Two water creatures are dividing the waters of the Jordan River in opposite directions - read Ps. 113. The baptism of Jesus has two aspects - revealed is that there are three Persons in one God. "Our God, the Trinity, has this day revealed himself to us indivisibly, for the Father bore witness to his parenthood with manifest testimony, the Spirit descended from the heavens like a dove, and the Son bowed his most pure head to the Forerunner and was baptized." The second aspect is that washings established by the prophets have reached their perfection in Christ Jesus who has founded the sacrament of baptism. Over the course of time, as an outgrowth of our 150th anniversary year, we hope to feature other artistic and devotional works within the church that give us a foretaste of heaven.

THE GOOD NEWS

Today's readings begin with a few verses from the book of Job. First, Job complains that his nights drag on endlessly. Then, worse yet, "My days are swifter than a weaver's shuttle; / they come to an end without hope" (Job 7:6). Not exactly encouraging, these lamentations, not when taken alone.

Most of us have been there, though, and the antidote is the "good news" that Paul found so compelling that "an obligation has been imposed on me, and woe to me if I do not preach it!" (1 Corinthians 9:16). Paul felt driven to announce the gospel to as many people as possible, "to save at least some" (9:22).

This good news is the mystery of the life, death, and resurrection of Jesus Christ, who lifted Simon Peter's mother-in-law from her sickbed with a mere touch of his hand. "The whole town was gathered at the door. He cured many who were sick with various diseases, and he drove out many demons" (Mark 1:33–34)).
