

About the Cover – Pictured on the bulletin cover is the exterior of the Reconciliation Room here in St. Patrick Church. Originally, in the transepts of the church, there were two confessionals as they were (and still are) called in which the Sacrament of Reconciliation is celebrated. This sacrament is also called Penance and Confession. Today's Reconciliation Room incorporates one of the two original confessionals. Sometime during the 1990s, the confessional on St. Joseph's side of the church was dismantled for storage leaving the one on Blessed Virgin Mary's side in use. During the 2004 renovations, the remaining confessional was used in the construction of the Reconciliation Room in which the sacrament may be celebrated face to face with the priest or if the penitent prefers behind a screen to preserve anonymity. The two older confessionals dated from 1911. The wood from the dismantled confessional was used to construct the St. John the Evangelist Shrine and the reredos (backdrop) of the baptistery. This confessional was a gift from Mr. and Mrs. George Killeen costing \$150. The confessional that found its way into the Reconciliation Room was a gift from Mrs. Mary White and her daughter, Mrs. M Sullivan.

Over the course of time as an outgrowth of our 150th anniversary year in 2016, we hope to feature other artistic and devotional works within the church that give us a foretaste of heaven.

According to a Gallup poll earlier this year, fewer than four in 10 Catholics in the United States attend Mass in any given week and overall Mass attendance is down six percentage points over the past decade. There are far too many variables to get into the "why" for this bulletin, but needless to say we have much work to do!

The most important things we can do to help in this regard, especially in relation to young people/adults, is to begin with what not to do: do not force someone to go to Mass, do not be critical of them, and do not nag.

Pope St. John Paul II said simply, "The Church proposes; she imposes nothing." Those who successfully draw their fallen away neighbors back to the Church instead pray for them and invite them, gently and respectfully, through warm conversation and unconditional love. Don't complain; invite them to something better.

It can be as simple as asking, "Would you consider coming with me to the thing that gives me the greatest joy in my life?"
