About the Cover – The image on the bulletin cover is another familiar image of the Blessed Virgin Mary – The Immaculate Heart of Mary to be exact! In 1885, statues replaced the paintings on the side altars. Those paintings were restored in 2017 and now hang in the front of church near the side altars. The current statue of Our Lady is not the original one but a replacement donated by Miss Margaret Murray for \$54. The two side altars themselves were both gifts of Mrs. James (Mary) Ryan for \$600. It appears from records that these were gifts from around 1912 when the church was extended and remodeled. As an aside, in the connecting hall between the church and the parish center, there are some photographs from around 1920. One of the photographs shows Mary's altar with an ornate reredos (background). The reredos included two relief carvings – one of the Annunciation and the other of the Visitation. This background was removed apparently in the 1940s. Anybody know what happened to them? Over the course of time as an outgrowth of our 2016's 150th anniversary year, we hope to feature other artistic and devotional works within the church that give us a foretaste of heaven.

A Message From Fr. Hinterschied

At the eleventh hour of the eleventh day of the eleventh month in the year of Our Lord 1918, World War I ended. Each year we honor the valor of those who fought in the Great War with Veterans Day, but the first name of this commemoration was Armistice Day because although Germany was defeated, there was no formal surrender. Rather, Germany simply agreed to cease hostilities and await negotiations later.

This distinction is important because while the shooting stopped, the war was not really over. Uneasy peace was violently interrupted by Germany on 1 September 1939, next year marking the 80th anniversary of the start of the bloodiest conflict in human history. But if one sees the two World Wars and the Cold War that followed as one continuous conflict rather than as distinct events, then it is easier to grasp that in the last century Western Civilization very nearly committed suicide.

The end of World War I saw the collapse of the empires, the Germans, the Russians, the Ottomans, and the Austro-Hungarian Empire, and from the wreckage of those arose the poisonous ideologies of Fascism, National Socialism, Communism, and Islamism.

All of which should make us grateful for the valor of those in every time and place who have stood in the breach, particularly those who fought to preserve civilization in the War to End All Wars. Today, remember the brave souls who gave to those who came after them the precious opportunity to start again in the constant work of building a culture of life, liberty, and peace.

Blessing Children During Communion – If a child who has not received their First Eucharist wishes to join the line during Holy Communion, they are welcome to do so, but blessing the child individually is not part of the Communion Rite, which is from “The Lord’s Prayer” to the “Prayer after Communion”. The prayers are rich and varied in meaning but do not speak of receiving a blessing. The children are asked to bow in reverence to the Eucharist and return to their seat. A blessing during the Concluding Rite at the end of Mass is for all.

Church And Parish Center Repair - The parish has contracted with Quality Masonry to perform needed repairs to the church and parish center buildings. The work is just getting underway, and will include stucco and concrete repair, window trim and cupola painting, replacement of the wall around the handicapped ramp, repair of the ceiling above the choir loft, and parish center spot tuck-pointing and exterior painting. The total project cost is \$80,980, with rebates from the Bishop’s Annual Appeal anticipated to fund most of the expense. Please watch for any restricted areas around the buildings while the work takes place. We appreciate your patience.

TREASURES FROM OUR TRADITION

New religious faith gives fresh lenses for viewing human customs, and the wisdom to transform them. In the ancient world, the Romans feared the dead. Funeral customs were designed to hasten the departure of souls to the next world. Cremation was the rule, although burial increased in popularity in the second century. Procession from the place of death to the place of cremation or burial was the most important part of the funeral. Those who carried the funeral bier carried it low, close to the ground, to promote the soul's departure to the nether world.

Christians, on the other hand, did not fear the dead, but cherished them as they consigned them to Christ's love and protection. Gradually, they began to reject customs rooted in fear. Christians carried their dead to their resting places singing, with the bier carried high, away from the ground and toward the heavens. For the Christian, the grave was a sign of hope and a place of remembrance. Superstitious Romans feared burial places, and so the Christians cherished them as places of remembrance and prayer, and in time, even celebrated the Eucharist there. In November, many of us visit the cemetery for prayer and the autumn clean-up. By cherishing our dead, we are responding in faith to a vital part of our Christian tradition.
