**SECOND COLLECTION (March 9/10):** The Black and Indian Mission collection is scheduled during the first weekend of Lent. The proceeds of this collection are distributed as grants to dioceses to help support and strengthen the evangelization programs in Black, American Indian, Eskimo, and Aleut communities in the U.S.

**About the Cover** – Pictured on the bulletin cover is our venerable statue of St. Patrick, patron of our parish. Usually observed on March 17, his day would generally be ranked as a solemnity for our parish but this year it gives way to the Lord's Day, the Second Sunday of Lent. Not to worry, we'll celebrate our beloved St. Patrick – please refer to the bulletin for details. St. Patrick, who died in 461, was born in Britain but was taken to Ireland where he was sold into slavery at the age of 16. After escaping, he became a priest and eventually a bishop. He is credited with evangelizing both Britain and Ireland. Returning to the land of his slavery was a great challenge to Patrick, who persevered. Patrick is now the patron saint of Ireland along with St. Bridget, and St. Columba. This statue of St. Patrick, costing \$62, was a gift to the parish from former pastor, Fr. Abraham McNamara around 1916. Life size and realistic in depiction, this statue has aged with the years. Earlier photographs show St. Patrick had quite the dark beard and hair at one time but after a century who wouldn't be gray. The statue shows St. Patrick vested as an archbishop, with the pallium of a metropolitan archbishop, the miter and crozier of a bishop, the chasuble of a priest, and the dalmatic of a deacon – the fullness of orders that is a bishop. Not to be forgotten, St. Patrick holds out a shamrock with its three leaves to remind us of the three divine persons of the Blessed Trinity. Over the course of time we hope to feature other artistic and devotional works within the church that give us a foretaste of heaven.

**A Message From Fr. Hinterschied**

"What name do we give this Mass?" Since 2007 there have been many misunderstandings regarding the name "Extraordinary Form". Pope Benedict XVI used the term in his motu proprio *Summorum Pontificum* in order to solve a conundrum.

Traditionally in the history of the Church - bi-ritual priests have been exceptional. They still are an exception, so it is incorrect for us to say there's both an "Old Rite" and a "New Rite" of Mass in the Latin Rite. Additionally, Benedict XVI felt the need to answer a question that had been created with the *Novus Ordo Missae*: had it and subsequent documents that modified all rites of sacraments, abrogated the Traditional Roman Rite?

The use of the term "form" solved both problems: it did not make all priests in the Latin Church immediately bi-ritual and, most importantly, it confirmed the impossibility of the abrogation of a liturgical rite of immemorial origin (as the Pope implied when he wrote: "what earlier generations held as sacred, remains sacred and great for us too, and it cannot be all of a sudden entirely forbidden or even considered harmful," the immemorial liturgical Rites and Uses of the Latin Church could not and cannot be simply abrogated.)

Despite this, the expression "Extraordinary Form" is NOT the "official" name of the Traditional Roman Rite. It is just one of the many ways to refer to it.

The motu proprio itself uses many different names: "extraordinary use", "ancient form", "the Roman Missal promulgated by St. Pius V and reissued by Bl. John XXIII", "extraordinary expression", and also the "earlier liturgical tradition".

These are just the "official" names - there are also expressions that are established in the vernacular, and probably the most familiar in English is Traditional Latin Mass.

Lastly, in the current pontificate, the rite has more than once been called "Vetus Ordo", including once by Pope Francis himself, and once in the document of intervention in the Franciscans of the Immaculate. Besides, with the coming canonization of the Pope of 1962, we will soon have reason to mention the Missal of Saint John XXIII...

**RELIGIOUS EDUCATION NEWS**

**What is the Rite of Sending?** Next week, the first Sunday of Lent, Catholic bishops across the entire world will welcome those sent by the parish to gather together with their godparents in what is known as the Rite of Election. The Rite of Sending, ordinarily held earlier on the same day, offers the parish community an opportunity to acknowledge the spiritual progress the catechumens have made, express approval of their election, and send them forth to our bishop with assurance of the parish's care and support. To send a catechumen to the bishop means the parish has discerned that the person is ready to enter the Catholic Church. In this Rite, those preparing for Baptism are invited to come forward and sign a book, which we call the "Book of the Elect," as a sign of their desire to be numbered among the chosen of God.

**LENT** is an important season in the Church's liturgical year. It is a 40-day period of fasting, abstinence and repentance that begins on Ash Wednesday. No meat is eaten on Ash Wednesday, Fridays during Lent, and Good Friday. The season culminates with the liturgies of Holy Week, which recall the passion and death of Jesus Christ. Purple is used for vestments and altar cloths during Lent. At Mass, the Gloria is omitted and the word "alleluia" is not said or sung.
